LAW OBSERVANCE PROGRAM PRAISED

Senator George W. Norris, of Nebraska, and William Allen White, famous Kansas editor, are among the hundreds of public leaders in the United States voicing confidence in the moderation and law-observance activities of the United Brewers Industrial Foundation.

Foundation brewers are working for maintenance of wholesome conditions wherever beer is sold, and are co-operating with the authorities for elimination of objectionable conditions whenever they may be found in places licensed to sell beer.

"It is a source of gratification to learn that the brewers of Nebraska have organized themselves to give aid and assistance to the officers of the law who are trying to punish the violators, and also to refuse to sell beer to any retailers who are guilty of violating the law," said Senator Norris.

Senator Norris expressed belief that the Foundation program, as exemplified in Nebraska, is of national importance because it is setting an example "that will undoubtedly be followed in other states."

Mr. White indicated his belief in the brewers' sincerity, when he published an editorial, headed "Beer Statesmanship," in The Emporia Daily Gazette, declaring:

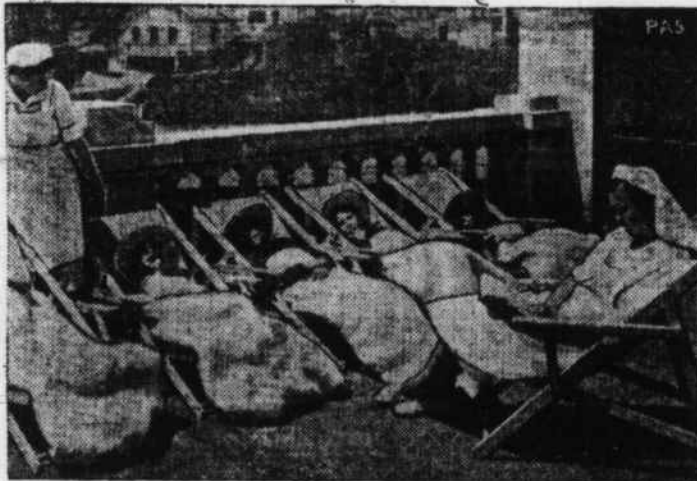
"It has become obvious ever since the repeal of prohibition that the American brewers were determined not to make the mistake that the brewers made in pre-prohibition days. . . They pledged themselves to support 'duly constituted authorities for the elimination' of anti-social conditions in the beer business.

"It was obvious that Kansas is the one place in the United States where the United Brewers Industrial Foundation could come and find a fertile field. They sent a representative to Kansas. This agent of the brewers made a genuine and certainly an effective campaign to weed out the bad practices. The Gazette knows definitely two cases where evidence was furnished by the Brewers' Foundation to close up certain joints.

"There is no reason why the beer business should not be conducted as any other commercial business - breakfast food, toothpaste, tenderized ham, packaged coffee or shoes.

"Apparently the Brewers' Foundation means business."

LETTUCE IMPROVES

The lettuce crop of southeastern Carolina, hard hit by cold and rain, has improved greatly in recent weeks, reports J. P. Herring, veteran farm agent in that territory. 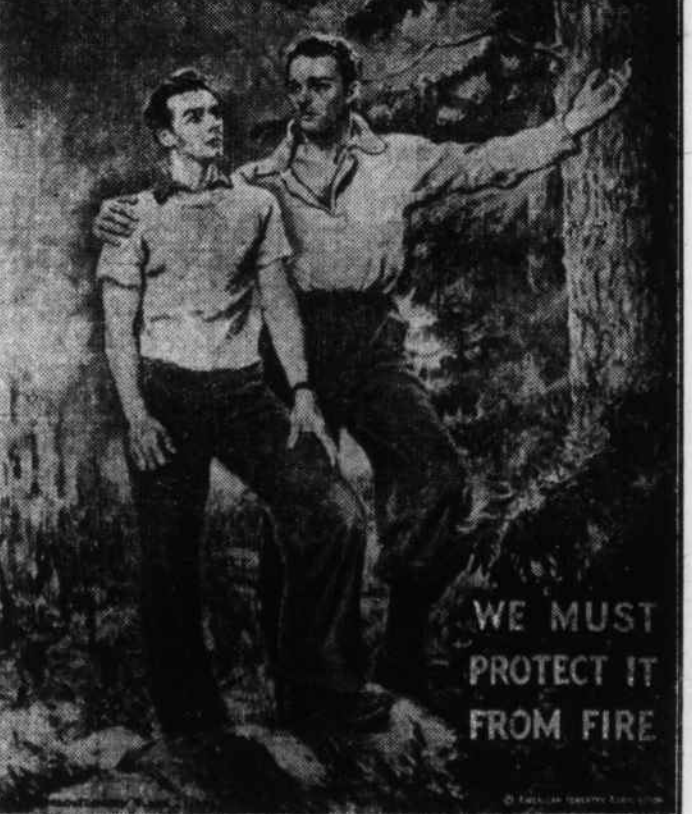
