THE FRANKLIN COUNTY A. B. C. BOARD

Next week a joint meeting of the Board of County Commissioners, the Board of Education, and the Board of Health will elect a Board to operate the Franklin County ABC Stores. The ABC Board conducts for the people of Franklin County the only private business, or business for profit, that the County engages in. A good business administration of the ABC Stores means good law enforcement, the breaking up of bootleggers and a tremendous saving to every taxpayer in the County.

There are a number of candidates who are seeking appointment on this Board, and being interested in the welfare of the people of our County, and in saving money for our taxpayers, I have enough interest to express my opinion on this vital question. I feel that the present ABC Board has made a very good record and believe that they have done as well as any other Board in the State. The present Board is made up of two successful businessmen and one successful farmer. The Board started a brand new business without the County having had the benefit of any past experience in the operation of ABC Stores. They started without one dollar in the bank and without the credit of the County to back them, and during their one term of office, the records show that they have paid into the Treasury of Franklin County, for the benefit of all of its taxpayers, \$50,000.00, and have also paid for all of the stock in the ABC Stores, amounting to close to \$30,000.00. This has been done without one cent of cost or expense to the taxpayers of the County. I believe that every citizen in the County will admit that there are less stills and blind tigers in the County now than when the ABC Board started operating, and that conditions in the communities in the County have improved.

On account of the amount of business transacted and for the reason that the ABC business is operated along business lines similar to a store or any other private business, it only seems reasonable to me that the Chairman of the Board should be located or always available at the County seat. The present ABC Board, by their efficient business methods, have been successful in handling this branch of the County's business and I feel that they should have the thanks of the people of the County for the splendid manner in which they have handled the ABC Stores. I, personally, feel that I am publicly expressing the sentiments of the majority of our citizens.

Public servants who have served the public well in their first term of office should be called upon to continue their good work for a second term. I feel that the joint Boards meeting next week would be rendering a distinct public service to the people of our County to reappoint for a second term the present ABC Board.
