

> QUESTION: What is the besttemperature for proper curing of

ANSWER: The temperature changes with the various curing conditions and must be governed by the individual barn of tobacco. A temperature of from five to ten degrees higher than the outside temperature should be maintained in the barn until the leaf is fairly yellow. It should then be raised from four to five degrees each hour, depending upon the rapidity with which the green is fading, until a temperature of 120 to 125 degrees is reached. Hold this until the tips of the leaves begin to dry and then raise it from four to six degrees each hour until 135 \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* to 140 degrees have been reached. After the leaf is dry raise the temperature from 5 to 10 degrees an hour until 180 to 190 degrees is reached and hold until the leaf stem is dry in all parts of the
