EPSON GETS VICTORY IN OVERTIME CONTEST

Tall Grass in Right Field Proved To Be Margin of Victory

Epsom mixed two errors with Bing Miller's 12th-frame single and edged a 4-3 victory over Louisburg here Wednesday in a Tri-County League contest.

In the second inning T. Brummitt hit a ball to right field which got by the outfielder and was lost in the tall grass while Brummitt continued around the path for a homer, which was the margin of victory. (Looks like a lawn mower might win a game for Louisburg sometime.)

Hal Troutman's ninth-inning homer put Louisburg in a tie and sent the game into extra innings. It was Troutman's second round-tripper of the afternoon; he had parked one in the third, with one on. Each blow cleared the left-field barrier.

Epsom took a 3-2 lead in the sixth inning. Marshall Peterson, first up, was safe at first on an error. He stole second, and came home on Bob Lassiter's double.

Epsom put the clincher on in the 12th. With two out, Bing Miller singled and went to third when Peterson's long drive was dropped in rightfield. Miller came in when Thomas Brummitt's grounder was errored at second.

Lassiter led Epsom's 11-hit offense, with two doubles for three turns. Howard Hobbgood was next-best, with three singles for six.

Troutman and Marshall Wiggins led Louisburg's 12-hit offense, with two for five. One of Wiggins' blows was a double.

GREYSTONE WIN, 9-3

Greystone, Aug. 2.—Greystone mixed 11 hits with two errors and turned back Pilot, 9-3, here today.

Greystone jumped to a 2-0 lead in the first inning and put on the clincher in the third with a three-run blast.

Harold Bisette led Greystone's 11-hit attack, with three singles for five tries. Dan Reynolds and E. Roberson hit homers. Jack Mitchell led Pilot, with a pair of singles for three.

LOUISBURG CLUB WINS, EXECUTES TRIPLE PLAY

With a large crowd of fans on hand at the local ball park Sunday Louisburg defeated Epsom, 7-5 in a playoff of a postponed Tri-County League game. It was the first loss for Epsom in six league starts.

Pitcher Red Wheel, with three for four, and John Cameron with two for four, led Louisburg. Wheel's hits included a mighty wallop over the left-field wall.

Louisburg executed a triple play in the seventh. With three on, Tony Gallowich, of Wake Forest football fame, lined to Shortstop Timberlake. The ball was thrown to Troutman at third to catch Dickerson, and then to Wiggins at first to catch Hobbgood.

Leaders for Epsom were Claude Dickerson, two for three, and George Eaves, two for four. David Peterson lifted one over the left field wall for a homer in the eighth.

Louisburg players suffered injuries in this game. A ball which took a bad hop in center-field hit Brantley in the face, and another bad-hopper caught Wiggins, first baseman, on the chin. At both instances the game was held up until they could revive.

Grady Wheeler, third baseman, suffered an injured hand when Bing Miller, manager of the Epsom team slid into him at third base. He had to leave the game.

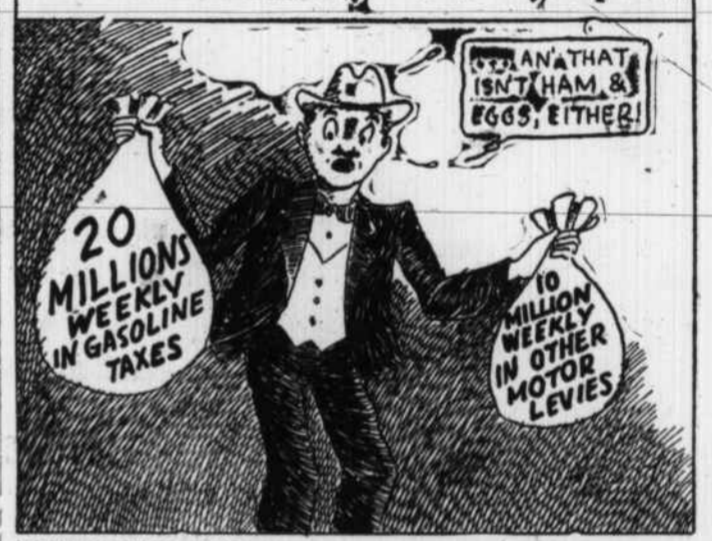
