Herbert Hoover was a worker. He father died when he was six years the ninth. old, his mother when he was nine; and he went to live with an uncle who operated a Quaker academy in and C. Doak. Oregon. Herbert earned his board by doing odd chores, feeding and currying the horses, milking cows, and tending the furnace. All of this was in addition to his regular tory outside of school hours. Later afternoon. in Salem, Oregon, Herbert worked as an office boy for his uncle, and enough credits to enter Leland Stan ford university. He worked his way through by acting as clerk for the registrar, and handling and delivering the San Francisco News on the campus. Later he started a laundry agency, calling for the bags of soiled laundry and delivering the bundles himself.

In 1893, Herbert Hoaver got a job with the United States Geological society. He had natural ability at ngineering. That together with the habit of work, gained rapid progress for him. He became nationally known as a successful engineer and a business man. In 1928 he became


