DIPHTHERIA

Diphtheria is a contagious disease, caused by the Klebs Loeffler bacillus. There have been four cases reported in Franklin County during the past month, two of these children were very ill and were sent to the hospital where it was necessary to put a tube in the throat. The death rate from diphtheria is greatest among infants under six months of age, and the incidence of diphtheria is greatest among children between the ages of six months and six years although all ages have the disease.

The last Legislature passed a bill requiring that all children six months to six years shall be given Diphtheria Toxoid.

The disease is spread by coming in contact with some discharge from a diphtheria patient's nose or throat, some times from this discharge being on the bed clothes, pencils and other articles. It is earnestly suggested that parents have their young children vaccinated against Diphtheria by their family physician, or bring them to the Health Department where they will be gladly vaccinated. Vaccination is successful in preventing Diphtheria in 90 per cent of cases.

A Federal veterinarian, checking up on sick hogs in Pitt County gave as causes for most of the trouble poor management, mineral deficiency, and unsanitary conditions.
