

**LION AT FRANKLINTON NAMED ZONE CHAIRMAN**

**Grover B. Harris, School Superintendent, Appointed to Succeed W. P. Kanto**

Franklinton, Dec. 11.—Appointment of Lion Grover B. Harris, superintendent of the Franklinton schools as Zone Chairman of Zone One, Region One, District 31-C, Lions International, was announced here tonight by District Governor Nell Hester, of Raleigh. Lion Harris succeeds Lion W. P. Kanto, of Apex, who resigned when he left the State to become Town Manager at Norton, Virginia.

As Zone Chairman, Lion Harris will have charge of Apex, Raleigh, Henderson and Franklinton clubs under the direction of Deputy District Governor Claude T. Bowers, of Warrenton. The new Zone Chairman is a charter member of the Franklinton club and one of its vice-presidents. He has taken an active part in the development of the local organization. His appointment takes effect immediately.

District Governor Hester, besides presenting Lion Harris as the new Zone Chairman for Zone One, paid his official visit to the Franklinton Den. Accompanying him were District Secretary-Treasurer F. B. Hall, of Raleigh; and Lion C. R. Philpot, chairman of the extension committee of the Raleigh club, both of whom spoke briefly. The meeting was held in the school building and presided over by President A. B. Ahen.

**SILVER LOVING CUP**

Youngsville.—The Youngsville School received today the Silver Loving Cup which is awarded annually to the best judging team at the Franklin County Fair. This is the third consecutive year that Youngsville has won the cup. The Youngsville team was composed of Holman Cyrus, Charles Cyrus and Royce Powell. In the contest, held in connection with the Franklin County Fair sometime ago, Holman and Charles Cyrus made a perfect score in the identification of crop seed. They identified thirty different samples of seed without an error.

The contest was divided into two items: Seed judging and identification of seed. They had four samples of seed to judge according to their seed value in the following crops: Corn, lespedeza, oats and soybeans. Thirty samples of seed (cultivated and weed) commonly grown in North Carolina were on display to be identified.

Last spring in competition with seventy-eight schools at the N. C. Crop Improvement Seed Exposition held in Rocky Mount the Youngsville team placed fifth.

The 1937 Seed judging team was composed of Bland Hill, Jones Winston and Gordon Goswick.

The 1938 team was composed of Holman Cyrus, Bland Hill and Eugene Franklin.

The 1939 team made the highest score that has been made since
