QUESTION: What is the na-ture of, and the control for, the rust which often attacks leaves

and fruit of apples?

ANSWER: Rust is one of the oddest diseases affecting the apple. The parasite which causes this disease spends part of its life cycle on the apple and part on the common red cedar tree. The presence of both of these plants is essential to the existence of the rust parasite. Elimination of the red cedar trees for a distance of onehalf mile or more from the chard is the only practical method of controlling apple urst.
