**HITCH-HIKER INJURED WHEN HIT BY TRUCK**  
 Franklinton, May 1.—A hitch-hiker identified by police as Franz Keningsveld, about 54, a Hollander of Norfolk, Va., was injured this morning when struck by a truck driven by Woodrow Perry, of Rolesville.  
 The accident occurred about a half-mile from Franklinton. Eye-witnesses said Keningsveld appeared to have jumped in the path of the truck, and Police Chief J. A. Dennis, who directed investigation, said the driver was not at fault and did not detain him. The eye-witnesses told officers that Perry swerved the truck in an effort to avoid striking the man.  
 The injured man was taken to a Henderson hospital. His injuries were given as five rib fractures and lacerations of the head. He was knocked unconscious by the impact, but regained consciousness before being taken to the hospital. He would make no statement, officers said.

 The Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs held its first meeting of this year at the Agricultural building, Saturday, April 27. The general theme of the program was Flowers. Mrs. Quentin Gregory, State U. D. C. Historian, and a Club Woman from Halifax gave a most helpful demonstration in flower arrangements which was the high spot of the morning program. Mrs. Gregory exhibited a large display of flower containers. Most of the containers were soft greens, whites and ivory colored. She had a few blue and clear glass containers. None of them had contrasting colored designs. Mrs. Gregory said, "baskets are the hardest of all flower containers to arrange." A number of flower holders for vases were shown and discussed and Mrs. Gregory told the women that ordinary chicken wire made a most satisfactory holder. One of her most timely suggestions was concerning the arrangement of pansies. Select a low bowl for pansies, put a small holder in the center of the bowl and put sand in the bowl to hold the pansies or sand alone may be used. Mrs. Hazel Wheeler, Home Agent in Halifax County, assisted Mrs. Gregory in putting on the demonstration.  
 There was no afternoon program but most of the women brought lunch and enjoyed the lunch hour together. Some of the women remarked that they enjoyed the fellowship of the lunch hour as much as any part of the Federation program.  
 C. S. Simmons, of Pollocksville, Jones County, has a demonstration poultry flock of 114 hens that returned him a net profit of \$43.17 in March, reports Assistant Farm Agent Jack Kelly.
