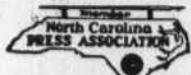

Mrs. Nellie P. Ballard, widow of the late Hon. Benjamin W. Ballard, of Franklin, died at the home of her daughter, Dr. and Mrs. R. F. Yarborough in Louisburg about 4 o'clock Thursday morning of last week following a brief illness. She was 83 years of age and is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Dr. R. F. Yarborough, Mrs. William F. Joyner, of Franklin, and Miss Kate Ballard, of Raleigh; and two sisters, Misses Nena and Maria Parker of Warrenton. She was the daughter of the late Jacob and Maria Kearney Parker, of Warrenton, where she was born and reared. She was a member of the Franklin Methodist Church.

The funeral services were held from the Methodist Church at Franklin on Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock, conducted by Revs. E. H. Davis and J. G. Phillips, and interment was made in the Franklin cemetery beside the tomb of her husband. The pallbearers were: A. H. Vann, Dr. A. R. Winston, W. B. Barrow, G. B. Egerton, E. M. Speed, J. S. Morris.

The floral tribute was especially large and pretty and both services were largely attended.

MRS. ISADORE COOK STRICKLAND DEAD

Mrs. Isadore Cook Strickland died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. R. Terrell, near Mapleville, on Tuesday of last week. She had been in failing health for the past few years and was seriously ill the past two weeks, resulting from a fall.

She leaves to mourn their loss two daughters, Mrs. Terrell, Louisburg, Mrs. E. C. Collins, Castalia, two sons, Mr. J. W. Strickland, of Louisburg, also eight grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held from Maple Spring Baptist Church on Wednesday evening, conducted by the pastor, the Rev. John Edwards. Interment was made in the church cemetery.

The pallbearers were grandsons of the deceased: James Terrell, Billie Collins, John May, Sam Harris, I. P. Wheeler and W. N. Fuller, Sr.

The floral tribute was especially large and beautiful, bespeaking the love of her host of friends and loved ones. The flower girls were her granddaughters.

Mrs. William Eleanor Ballard, widely known and well beloved citizen of Franklin died of hypostatic pneumonia at the residence of her son-in-law, Dr. R. F. Yarborough in Louisburg, May 23, and was buried in Franklin the following day. She was the daughter of the late Jacob and Elizabeth Kearney Parker, of Warrenton, a family long prominent in the business and social life of that cultured community. Her mother was one of that famous family of eleven daughters and one son, many of whom came to distinction in this and other States, the wife of the late Gov. Elias Carr of this State being the youngest of them. Her husband, the late B. W. Ballard, of Franklin, to whom she was married in 1876 was for a number of years prominent in the business and church life of that community. Together they made a familiar and well beloved couple whose home abounded in hospitality and culture. Not only their own pastors—those of the Methodist Church, but ministers of all denominations and many others besides found frequently delightful entertainment beneath their hospitable roof. Mrs. Ballard was born Sept. 25, 1856, dying thus in her 84th year. There survive her three children, Mrs. Wm. F. Joyner, of Franklin, Mrs. Dr. R. F. Yarborough, of Louisburg, and Miss Kate Ballard, of Raleigh, and two sisters, Misses Nena and Rie Parker, of Warrenton. A brother and sister had preceded her, viz: Rev. W. C. Y. Parker, of New York, and Miss Bettie Parker, of Warrenton. Also two of her children had died, Mr. Walter Ballard, of Franklin, and Mrs. J. B. Cheatham, of Nashville, Tenn. The following grandchildren also survive her: Miss Nellie Ballard Joyner, teacher in Franklin Graded School, J. B. Joyner, of New York, Lieutenant B. Ballard Cheatham, U. S. Navy, Mrs. F. D. Duncan, Greenville, Richard P. Yarborough, U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, and Martha Ballard Yarborough, recent honor graduate of Louisburg Female College, and one great-grandchild, Master Hugh Duncan, of Greenville.

Several hundred rate-per-acre tests on small grain, corn, and cotton using 100, 200, and 300 pounds of Nitrate of Soda per acre against a check plot are being conducted in North Carolina through the county agents and agricultural teachers to more accurately determine the local requirements of nitrogen for the various crops. This work is being sponsored by the distributors of Arcadian, The American Nitrate of Soda, and will assist the farmers in determining the most profitable amount of nitrogen to use on crops.
