### CHANGES IN STAFF

John A. Lang, State NYA Administrator, announced yesterday several staff changes and the establishment of a new department in the Division of Finance and Statistics.

The Youth Administrator promoted W. B. Aycock, of Selma, N. C., to the post of Assistant Director of the Division of Work Projects. Mr. Aycock, a former President of the State College Student Body and Vice-President of the National Student Federation, has been State Supervisor of the NYA Resident Training Center Program since he became affiliated with this organization January 1, 1940.

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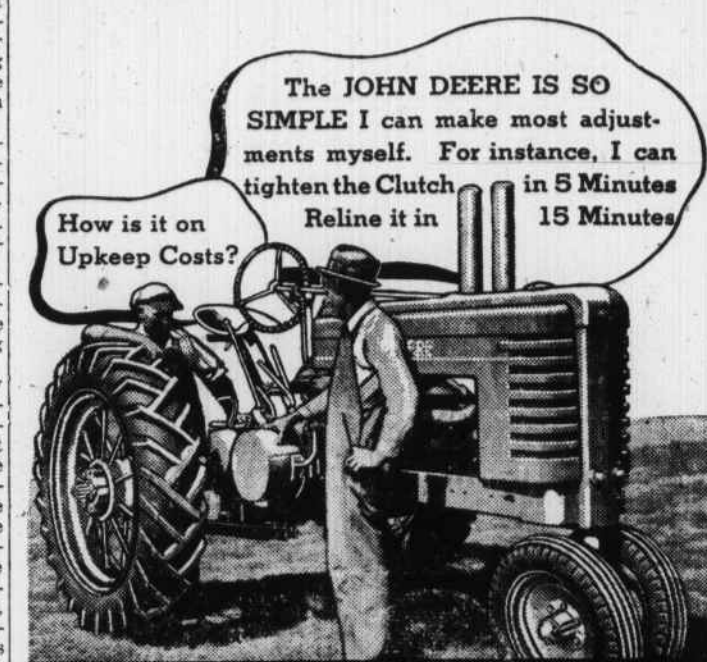

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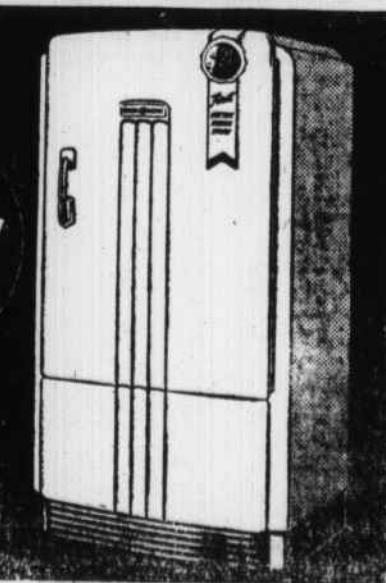
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
