Clevelight 7, Strain 2, leads in cotton variety tests conducted in Franklin County by W. T. Moss, Youngsville R1, and L. P. Gupton, Louisburg R2, with a production of 2272 pounds of seed cotton on an acre announces W. C. Boyce, County Agent. Messrs. Gupton and Moss planted 10 varieties of cotton on uniform land. All varieties were treated the same as to date of planting, fertilization and cultivation. Coker 200, St. 1, impressed the demonstrators by its small open growth, heavy fruiting and early maturity. On September 21, 68% of mature bolls were open. The next earliest variety was local variety which was Coker 100, St. 1, which had 53% of mature bolls open on same date. The production was figured by calculating weight of actual pickings on representative areas. The production of varieties are as follows:

**ARMY RECRUITING STATION IN RALEIGH HAS VACANCIES FOR BTRY. "B" 113TH F. A. & HQ. BTRY. 1ST BN., 113TH F. A., YOUNGVILLE**

Sergeant James H. Smith, officer in charge of the Army Recruiting Station, in Raleigh, announces that the War Department has allotted his station two vacancies for Battery "B" 113th Field Artillery, from Louisburg, and two for Headquarters Battery 1st Battalion, 113th Field Artillery, from Youngsville, also seven vacancies for Company "B" 120th Infantry from Warrington. These vacancies are for one year enlistments, and men will be assigned from in or near the towns in which these organizations are from.

Those eligible must be between the age of 18 to 35, single with no dependents, of good character and in good physical condition. Young men under 21 must have the consent of their parents. Eligible young men who want to enlist for one year and be assigned with their home town company may be enlisted at once by writing or applying in person to the Army Recruiting Station, Post Office Building, Raleigh, N. C.
