NEW LAWS

Institute of Government To
 Release Comprehensive Sum-
 mary of New State Laws
 Passed by 1941 General
 Assembly

Chapel Hill, April 9. The In-
 stitute of Government at Chapel
 Hill will release around April 20
 a comprehensive summary, inter-
 pretation and analysis of the
 principal state-wide laws passed
 by the 1941 General Assembly.
 Albert Coates, Director of the In-
 stitute, announced this week.

This study, copies of which will
 be available to Franklin County
 and city officials, is the culmination
 of the daily legislative bul-
 letin service rendered to cities
 and counties by the staff of the
 Institute during the recent session
 of the legislature.

Among the topics dealt with in
 detail, against the background of
 research by the Institute during
 and since the session, will be leg-
 islation concerning taxation, fi-
 nance, public health and safety,
 public schools, conservation and
 development, and many others.
 Supplemented by recent Supreme
 Court decisions and rulings of the
 Attorney General, the publication
 will treat with matters of both lo-
 cal and state-wide governmental
 importance.

The Institute will also make
 available to city and county offi-
 cials of Franklin County a sum-
 mary of local and special legisla-
 tion affecting the county and the
 cities and towns within it. Mr.
 Coates said. Both these services
 are part of the regular program
 of the Institute, which has com-
 pletely covered the last five ses-
 sions of the legislature for the
 benefit of counties, cities and
 towns within the state.

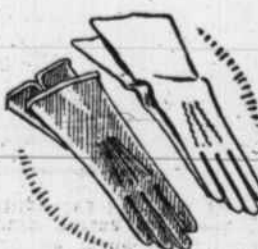

Franklin County One-variety
 Cotton Communities made good
 showing during the 1940 year
 when 35.4% of cotton ginned
 produced in these communities
 graded middling with 52.3% grad-
 ing strict low middling. The sta-
 ple length of this cotton showed
 16.09% one inch, 29% 1 1-32 in.,
 37.7% 1 1-16 in., 8.8% 1 3-32 in.,
 3.2% 1 1-8 in., and .04% 1 5-32
 in., with 0.1% of 1% going 1 7-32
 in.

1461 bales were ginned in the
 communities cooperating in one-
 variety cotton program. The vari-
 ety used in test was Coker 100.
 Centerville One-variety Commu-
 nity lead in production of mid-
 dling cotton and better with 277
 bales. The highest percentage of
 cotton graded as middling and
 better was produced in Mitchner
 One-variety Community where
 50% of samples classed were mid-
 dling or better.

The Centerville Community lead
 in number of samples grading one
 inch or better with 512 bales or
 93.4% of cotton ginned. Justice
 Community lead from percentage
 standpoint with 100% grading
 one inch or better in staple out of
 19 samples.

Communities desiring to co-
 operate with the one-variety cotton
 community program are request-
 ed to make application prior to
 August 15, 1941. Franklin County
 had one ginner complying in
 1939 and increased to six in 1940.
 It is believed that out of 19 gin-
 ners that ten will request grading
 service for their farmers cooper-
 ating in one-variety cotton pro-
 gram in 1941.
