Hitler to extend his Nazi domination to the Western Hemisphere, or to threaten it. We shall actively resist his every attempt to gain control of the seas. We insist upon the vital importance of keeping Hitlerism away from any point in the world which could be used and would be used as a base of attack against the Americas.

Every Assistance. "Second, from the point of view of strict naval and military necessity, we shall give every possible assistance to Britain and all who, with Britain, are resist-

ing Hitlerism or its equivalent with force of arms. Our patrols are helping now to assure delivery of the needed supplies to Britain. All additional measures necessary to deliver the good will be taken. Any and all further methods or combinations of methods, which can or should be utilized, are being devised by our military and naval technicians, who, with me, will work out and put into effect such new and additional safeguards as may be needed."

back a mile to stronger positions behind Canea, the capital. Some pockets of German resistance also remained around Candia and Retimo, to the east.

The Germans were believed to have had at start of the Crete campaign ten days ago a force of about 1,200 troop-carrying Junkers 52 planes, which might be called aerial troop lorries. They are capable of making 140 miles an hour.

Heavy Toll. However, long-range British fighters, including a number of Blenheim bombers rigged up as fighters, already have taken a heavy toll of German aircraft, particularly the troop carriers.

The Germans literally have squandered materials in the Crete invasion and the island is littered with wrecked planes shot down by the British officers say. (A small formation of German shock troops captured British batteries on Crete. Stefan, Italian news agency, said in an Athens dispatch, The Germans divided into small patrols and destroyed four. Stefan said. The operations of these Germans were supported by heavy infantry guns, mortars, and machine guns and the British had to hoist the white flag after heavy losses, it was claimed.)

The Turkish radio said that German losses in the Battle of Crete were so heavy that the Nazis probably would be unable to follow up with conquest of Cyprus. British-fortified island off the coast of Syria. The radio said the Germans had succeeded in landing some tanks on Crete which were pressing the British hard.)
