

Congressman Cooley To Be Speaker Installs Officers

Oil men from this county will meet with representatives of the petroleum industry from ten other nearby counties at the luncheon meeting of the N. C. Petroleum Industries Committee in Raleigh, N. C., on Wednesday, April 8, at 12:30 p. m.

Hon. Harold D. Cooley, member of Congress from the Fourth Congressional District, has tentatively accepted an invitation to be present and deliver the principal address. The Congressman can be expected to discuss matters which are of peculiar interest to oil men at this time.

Alonzo Squires, a blind law student at the University of North Carolina, will also be present and entertain the group with impersonations of National figures. The producer of the Fred Allen radio programs stated that the show put on by Squires in New York last fall was 33 per cent better than that of any other collegian to appear on the program so far.

The Raleigh meeting, which will be held at the Sir Walter Hotel, includes the counties of Chatham, Cumberland, Franklin, Granville, Harnett, Hoke, Johnston, Lee, Nash, Vance and Wake.

In addition to oil company agents, distributors and service station operators, members of allied organizations interested in highway transportation will attend as special guests of the Committee.

This is the fifth in a series of 10 district meetings being held throughout the state during March and April by the N. C. Petroleum Industries Committee.

S. Gilmer Sparger, Secretary of the State Committee, announced that discussions at all of the meetings would revolve around the great responsibilities being placed upon the petroleum industry during this period of emergency. "The oil industry," he declared, "is solemnly aware of its responsibility to guarantee that no plane, no tank, and no ship shall remain out of action for lack of oil, regardless of the temporary sacrifices which, of necessity, must be made by our civilian population for the duration of the war."

THIRD ANNIVERSARY

Raleigh, Mar. 30.—The Brewers and North Carolina Beer Distributors Committee will meet at Greensboro Thursday, May 28, in celebration of the third anniversary of the "clean up or close up" campaign in North Carolina.

The executive committee will meet at 10:30 o'clock and the general committee will hold a luncheon and business session beginning at 12:30 o'clock. Distributors and brewer representatives from all sections of the state are expected to attend the luncheon and business meeting.

The program includes a report by State Director Edgar H. Bain, of Goldsboro, and addresses by Bernard Lichtenberg and James R. Nicholson of the Brewing Industry Foundation, New York, sponsoring organization of the self-regulation program in North Carolina and 14 other states.

Chairman J. P. Price of Greensboro will preside at both sessions and among the items of business will be the selection of distributor members of the executive committee.

The self-regulation campaign was begun three years ago, and its success in ridding communities of undesirable beer outlets has won wide acclaim from newspapers and public officials.

Intrastate Rates Hiked

Utilities Commission Grants Increase to Railroads To Interstate Charges.

Raleigh, March 23.—The utilities commission today granted railroads permission to increase interstate freight rates within North Carolina, to correspond with increases allowed to interstate rates by the ICC.

The new intrastate rates will become effective April 1. They allow a 3 per cent increase on agricultural commodities and a 6 per cent increase on all other commodities.

The commission, however, refused a request by the railroads to boost intra-terminal costs. Also turned down was a request to increase the rates on unmanufactured tobacco, in less than carload lots, by 6 per cent. The commission held that the tobacco rates could be increased only 3 per cent regardless of whether it was shipped by carload or less than carload lots.

Investigations of castor beans as a source of oil, begun in Texas in 1938, have recently been reported in a bulletin issued by the Experiment Station in that State.

The Franklin County Health Department cooperating with the Extension Division of the North Carolina Sanatorium, has just completed a tubercular test in the schools of Franklin County.

Eight hundred and forty white and 897 colored children, a total of 1737, were tested with 175 white and 185 colored, total of 360, showing a positive reaction. Of this number 154 white and 167 colored were X-rayed.

Messrs. H. L. and C. J. Satterwhite, Technicians from the North Carolina Sanatorium made the X-ray examinations at Dr. H. G. Perry's office. The films from these X-rays were taken to the State Sanatorium and will be read there. Results of these readings will be reported to this office. 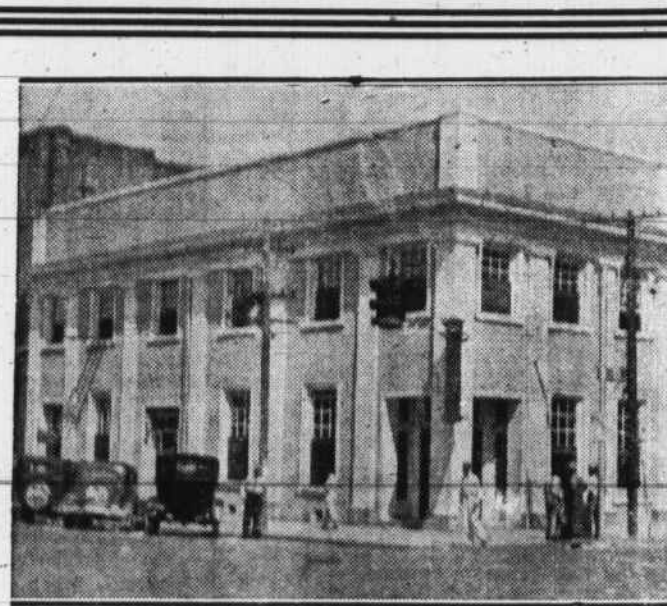
