Honors For War Production

North Carolina has led in many things; it leads again.

The Chatham Manufacturing Company, of Elkin, makers of blankets for the army, navy and marines, has been granted an award in recognition of having won the highest honor that the Army or Navy can bestow for war production.

Only nineteen other industrial concerns in the entire country have received such an award, and the Chatham concern is the only one between Baltimore and Miami.

The people of Elkin are highly elated over the recognition that has been paid their leading industrial establishment and on August 10, a special exercise will be held in the Y. M. C. A. which the Chatham company made possible for the town. At that time, General Corbin, chief of the supply division in the office of the Quartermaster General, will fly to Elkin to formally present the flag which the company will be entitled to fly over its plant. In addition, everyone of the 2,500 employees will be given a sterling silver pin in recognition of the part they have played in making the award possible. Former Governor Clyde R. Hoey will be master of ceremonies. Various state officials and other prominent individuals will be in attendance.

Home Demonstration Department

Lillie Mae Braxton, Home Demonstration Agent

No demonstrations are planned for the Home Demonstration Club women during the month of August. Most of the clubs have some form of recreational program planned for the women and their families. These are to be held in the local communities and consist of chicken fries, fish fries, watermelon slicings and watermelon slicings.

Mr. John Harris, Extension Landscape Specialist, offers the following suggestions for Yard Beautification for August:

- To renew your faith in the future, take a walk in the forest and observe the permanency and beauty of nature. Men and nations rise and fall; but nature, although abused, remains behind to help or destroy the next generation, depending on how well her laws are observed.
- Mark native trees and shrubs to be moved this fall before the leaves drop.
- Oriental poppies and Madonna lilies may be planted this month.
- To control plant lice spray or dust with nicotine sulphate.

5. Dust with sulphur to control mildew on phlox, grapes, roses, crepemyrtle and other plants.

6. Prepare ground for seeding lawn. Work manure into soil and allow to settle until October. Topsoil should be used if soil in yard is poor.

7. To retard the spread of mimosa wilt, remove and burn dead or dying mimosa trees. There is no remedy for this disease at the present time.

8. A number of hardy perennials may be started from seed this month including the more common ones listed below. The majority of these flower seed should be sown in boxes and the plants carried through winter in cold frames or at least given some protection from severe cold weather. Canterbury Bells, Shasta Daisy, Delphinium, Gaillardia, Heliopsis, Hollyhock, Silene, (Speedwell) Veronica, Pansy, Columbine, Foxglove.

9. Avoid close clipping of lawn, especially during hot, dry weather.

10. Continue making summer cuttings through August.

22 Beer Outlets In Franklin

There are 22 places of business in Franklin County licensed by the state to sell beer at retail.

Figures, compiled by the North Carolina Committee of the Brewing Industry Foundation as of August 1, disclosed that the State Department of Revenue has issued retail beer licenses to 3,398 outlets in 98 counties. Sale of beer is not permitted in Yancey and Mitchell counties.

These licenses have been issued by the state since the tax year (for beer licenses) began May 1, and it is anticipated that the number for the state will reach last year's total of 5,148 before the tax year ends nine months hence.

Mecklenburg county's 244 easily tops Guilford's 160. New Hanover is third with 129, followed by Cumberland with 127, Forsyth 119, Durham 118 and Buncombe 104.

These retail outlets and 111 wholesale establishments provide employment for 13,420 persons with an annual payroll of \$12,000,000, according to the Committee's figures.

For the 12-month period ended June 30, the North Carolina beer industry paid \$5,700,000 in federal, state and local taxes.
