The scene at Teheran—where the Nazis had unsuccessfully dropped agents by parachute — was marked by thousands of Allied troops, armor and guns, by Stalin honoring his Allied friends in smiling, glass-clinking toasts, by a party on the occasion of the 69th birthday of the ebullient Churchill, and by presentation of a handsome British-made "Stal-

a handsome British-made "Stalingrad Sword" to Stalin.

These and other details were
described in dispatches by Lloyd
Stratton, president of The Associated Press, Limited, British
subsidiary of The Associated
Press. Stratton and Edward Angly of the Chicago Sun were the
only two American correspondents who reached Teheran.
