The State ABC Board Friday announced a change in the pre viously announced value of "sales permit" coupons valid

during the month of April.

The earlier announcement placed the value of each coupon at one half pint. Friday's

pon at one half pint. Friday's announcement gives the month's four coupons a value of one pint each, but divides the coupons into two pairs and limits the items for which each pair may be used.

According to a wire Williamson sent to chairmen in the 25 ABC cour ties, coupons Nos. 17 and 18 will be valid any time in April for a total of "one quart, or two pints, or one fifth, or two tenths only of domestic whiskey, or Scotch, or domes-

or two tenths only of domestic whiskey, or Scotch, or domestic gin, or domestic brandy."

Coupons 19 and 20 will be valid any time during April for a total of "one quart or two tenths, or one fifth, or two tenths of all rum or imported brandy or all cordials."

The March value was one half pint per coupon.
