Ideas of our young people. They are the ones that will determine what will happen to the national debt and to every stock and bond. I do not say that youths have better judgment than their parents; nor that they are less likely to change their minds. All I say is that our returning service men should be better able to forecast the future.

Many people worry as to what extent the Russian shadow is to fall upon this country, especially during the next depression. They see Russia becoming such a world power that they fear she will Russianize Europe and England and that the effects of this will ultimately be felt in America. This certainly seems reasonable; but a twenty-two year old flier, returned from delivering airplanes to Russia, said to me: "Don't worry about Russia. She will have her own postwar troubles. Sixteen Russian generals are already planning to get Stalin's berth."

A. H. CHEEK DIES AT HIS HOME HERE

Henderson, April 17.—Alston Hayes Cheek, 61, for more than thirty years prominently connected with banking in Henderson, died at 8:30 o'clock Monday evening at his home on Chestnut Street after a brief illness. He had been in poor health for some time.

At the time of his death and for many years before that, Mr. Cheek had been assistant cashier and secretary of the Citizens Bank & Trust Company in Henderson, and was widely known in banking circles in the State. He was otherwise interested in business, civic and church circles in the city. He was a lifelong member of Holy Innocents Episcopal Church here, and at the time of his death was a member of the vestry of that congregation.

He was born in Henderson July 4, 1882, the son of Colonel William Hayes Cheek and Alice Mutter Jones, of "Woodley" in Warren County, and had lived in Henderson practically all of his life. He was esteemed by a host

of friends and acquaintances.

Surviving are the widow, the former Miss Helen Lamb, of Henderson; a son, Alston Hayes Cheek, Jr., U. S. N. R., Quartermaster School, Bainbridge, Md.; a daughter, Helen Lamb Cheek of Henderson; one brother, A. J. Cheek, of Henderson, and two sisters, Mrs. A. Bradley, of Burlington, and Mrs. A. S. Hall, of Oxford.

Funeral services will be held at Holy Innocents Episcopal Church at 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, in charge of the rector, Rev. Ray Holder. Interment will be in Elmwood cemetery here.
