4-H Clubs From School To Community

The changing of our 4-H Club program from school clubs to community clubs has opened new doors to opportunities, not only to 4-H club members but to 4-H Club leaders as well. During 1961 when the change first began to take place, our 4-H Clubs were organized into 17 4-H Clubs, with a membership of 1600 club members. These clubs were organized in the public schools of Franklin County.

In 1962, machinery was set up to start community clubs throughout the county. The Agricultural and Home Economics Agents discussed the operation in our clubs and many of us were very sad because we didn't know enough about community clubs.

To date, we have a total of 52 community clubs organized in 12 communities. These communities are Epsom, Katesville, New Liberty, Copeland Perry, Concord, Cedar Street,
