## Prof. Nixon Speaks To Rotarians

"Is it not true we Americans take our freedom, our homes, our churches, and our liberties for granted?" the Rotarians were asked at their last meeting.

Demetrius Nixon, the speaker, professor of social studies at Louisburg College, lived as a youth in Greece. Mr. Nixon who had experienced German and Italian and later Communist conquest of his native land, commented that "we don't really realize what we have in a Democracy until it is lost." It was evident to his listeners that he was speaking from "the heart" since he recalled losing these same freedoms. "We must instill in our youth that which is American," he said. "I am the happiest man in the world to be a teacher, the most honorable profession, and to relay this message, America and Freedom, Liberty and Justice, to the student, the leaders of tomorrow."
