Is Delayed

Issues Of Wheat Vote Outlined

The issues on which wheat farmers will vote May 21 are really very clear-cut and the 1964 program is similar in most ways to programs which have been in effect for wheat crops in other years, John R. Davis, Office Manager of the Franklin County ASCS Office, said today. As in past votes on wheat quotas, the May 21 referendum will determine the program for only one year--

Davis declared, "present law virtually assure that another spring of 1964 for the 1965 crop."
