Feds Arrest Three, Take Man's Car

The revenouers returned to Franklin County Monday to complete a little unfinished business as a result of raids on a couple of booze plants last week - like the arrest of three men and confiscation of a car. Arrested were Willie Bell "Bill" Johnson, 41 year-old Franklinton, Route 2, negro Lewis "Bro" Harris, 31, also of Franklinton Route 2, and William Hartsfield, 46 yearold Route 4, Louisburg negro. Johnson and Harris were arrested as the result of a raid on an illicit booze making plant near Franklinton. Harris' car, a 1962 Ford, was confiscated by the officers, who said it was the car they were chasing when they skidded into a ditch and wrecked their car.

Both were jailed in Raleigh following a hearing before U.S. Commissioner Reva Rothrock. Johnson was later released under \$500 bond, but Harris remained in jail late Tuesday in lieu of \$1,500 bond.
