An Army career and basic training under the "Buddy Plan" is the choice of three area youths; Grover D. Jeffreys of Louisburg, James T. Johnson of Louisburg and Norman G. Dean, III of Zebulon.

The three boys, all of whom are 1963 high school graduates chose their training under the Army's "Graduate Specialist Program" and "Choose-It yourself" vocational training system. Both plans allowed them to choose from a wide variety of specialty training.

Grover D. Jeffreys, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Grover J. Jeffreys of Route 1, Louisburg, will take his training in Medical Care and Treatment. He is a 1963 graduate of Bunn High School.

James T. Johnson, a graduate of Louisburg High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James A. Johnson of 220 North Bickett Blvd., Louisburg. Johnson is a former member of the National Guard and will receive his training in Aircraft Maintenance. Bunn Plays Host To Area Developers

Eighty-two members of the seven - county Capital Area Development Association paid a visit to the Bunn Community Center on Wednesday for the 1962 community development competition-Wednesday afternoon.

All seven counties in the association were represented. Mrs. Joe Adams, of Bunn, County Community Development Chairman, was in charge of the tour, assisted by Gene Mullen, Bunn Community Development Chairman.

The group assembled at the Bunn School Agricultural Building for a talk and to see pictures of the development in the area. The tour listed 23 points of interest with stops being made at the N. J. Vollmer farm, Bunn Lumber Co.,

the Glenn Mitchell farms, Fire Department and new First Citizens building.

Weekly Wage Goes Further In Franklin County

Can a working man in Franklin County buy more food and clothing now, after a day's work, than he could have formerly? To what extent have local families benefited from the higher incomes they have been receiving in the last few years? With the changes that have been taking place in the cost of living, it is difficult sometimes for a family to know what progress it has been making, if any.

On the basis of figures released by the Tax Foundation, the Department of Labor and others, the average local family is better off today than it was in 1958, when a similar study was made.

It had an income last year that was approximately 11.5 percent higher than at that time. The increase in earnings more than made up for the rise in the cost of goods and services, which went up about 5.5 percent in the period. This takes into account such

costs of food, housing, apparel, transportation, medical and personal care, reading and recreation and miscellaneous items. The majority of them rose in price.

Some idea of the net change that has occurred, due to the fact that both incomes and living costs have moved upward, is to be gleaned from the figures that show the amount of time that the average American worker must put in to buy food and other articles.

Bunn Board Calls For Election, New Registration

The Mayor and Board of Town Commissioners of Bunn Wednesday night called for a general election in the town on July 27 to elect a mayor and

four town commissioners. A new voter registration has been ordered prior to the election. June 29, July 6, and July 13. The books will be open for filing all other days from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. except Sundays, but the registrar will not be required to be at the polling place.

The order for a new registration will require all persons, including those already registered, to register to vote in the election. The registration books will open at 9 a.m. June 22 and will close at 9 p.m. July 13. The registrar

will be at the polling place to register voters from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m. Saturday, June 22, June 29, July 6, and July 13. The books will be open for filing all other days from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. except Sundays, but the registrar will not be required to be at the polling place. Saturday, July 29 has been designated as Challenge Day. The filing deadline for persons wishing to offer as candidates for any of the offices is at 6 p.m. July 20. Candidates may file notice with the Town Clerk at any time prior to the deadline.

France The U.S.

Washington - Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville says United States-French common interest are so great that "nothing really serious can separate" the two nations. The French diplomat, in a recorded television interview said it is difficult to predict when President Kennedy and President de Gaulle may meet. He stated further that General de Gaulle owes a visit to President Kennedy.

Equal Pay Approval

Washington - Congress has approved the principle that women should be paid the same wages as men for equal work. Assistant Secretary of Labor Esther Peterson commented that it had taken sixteen years of plugging to get this recognition of justice. Labor Secretary Wirtz called passage "a major step in the long struggle toward providing full equality for women in our society."

Debt Limit Raised

Washington - The Senate passed and sent to the President legislation raising the national bill debt to \$307 billion. The bill as earlier passed by the House, raises the legal debt ceiling to \$307 billion from July through August 31, when the legal debt will need a further increase, estimates Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon.
