"You mean men like you?"

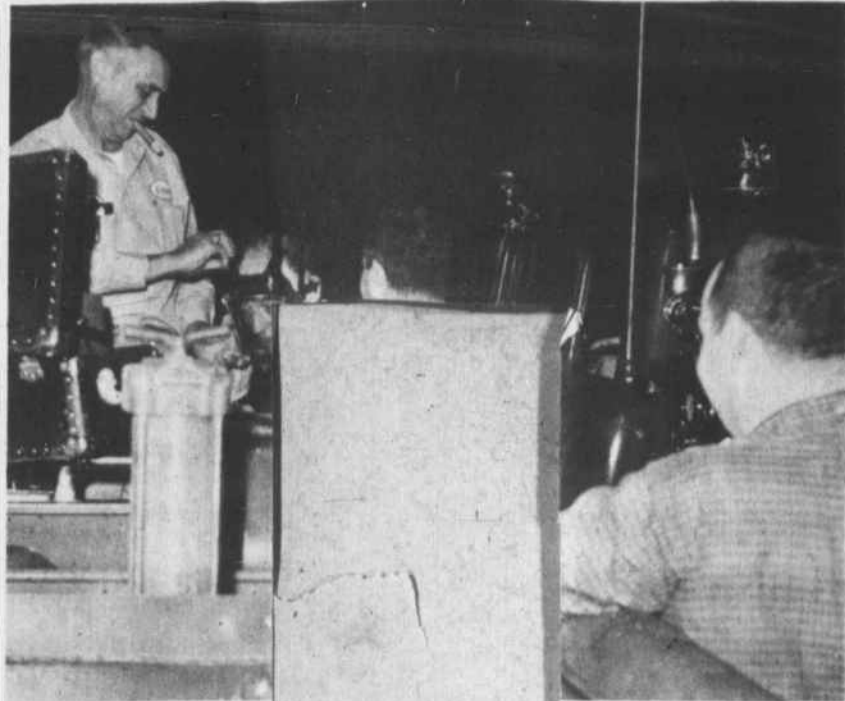
"Well yes I guess you might put it that way."
