Mrs. Brady Entertains

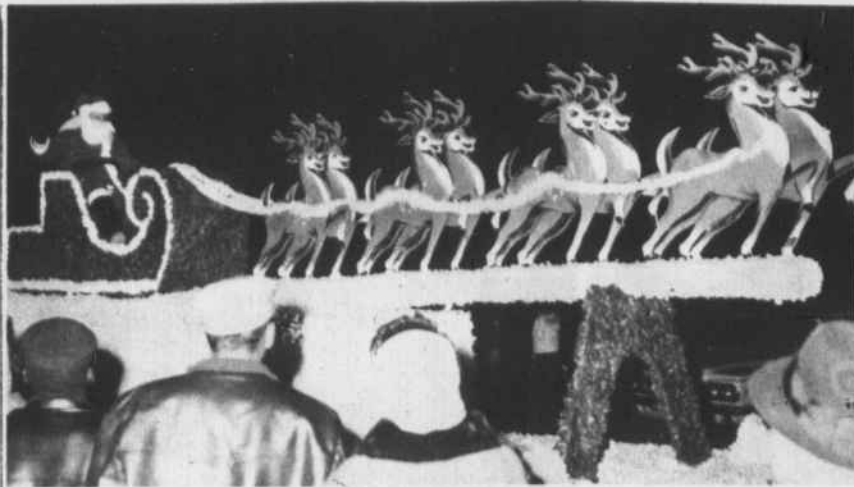
(Frk. B. W.) Mrs. J. E. Brady entertained her Sunday School Class at a party at her home on Friday evening.

Franklinton Home Owners Contest

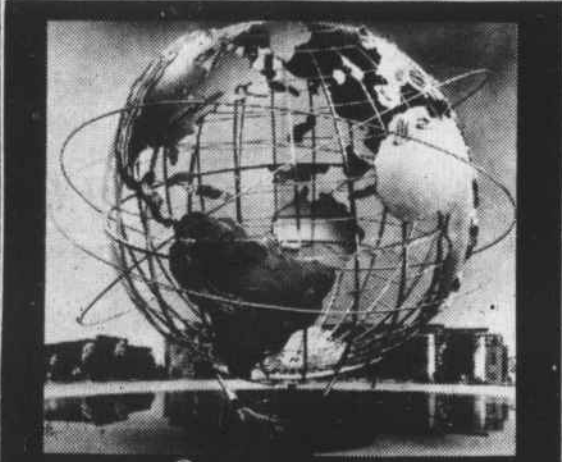
