Cotton Voters Favor Quotas

Cotton growers over the nation joined together on December 10 to vote overwhelmingly in favor of marketing quotas and price support for the 1964 cotton crop.

In Franklin County cotton growers voted heavily in favor of cotton marketing quotas for the 1964 crop. Of the 1122 votes cast, 1094 voted in favor of quotas and only 28 opposed quotas. 97.59% of the total votes cast were for the cotton program for the coming year.


