John Thomas Bulluck, 54 year old Pine Ridge resident, became Franklin County's first highway fatality of the year, in a single car accident near his home Sunday afternoon. Bulluck died instantly as his automobile ran off the road and overturned on the Pine Ridge Road just off N. C. Highway 39 near Bunn.

Passengers in the car were Mike Bulluck, 14 year old son of the victim and Bobby Key Bulluck, 4 year old grandson. The older boy was taken to Franklin Memorial Hospital and the younger was taken to Rex. Neither were reported to be seriously injured.

Bulluck was free under \$2500 Bond set before Judge Hamilton Hobgood, in the fatal shooting of his son, John Thomas Bulluck, Jr., on January 10 of this year. The trial was schefuled for the February term of Superior Court. The shooting took place at Bulluck's home as he made an attempt to separate his two sons, Larry and John Thomas, from a fight. Bulluck had contended the shooting was accidental.
