

# Kruschev's "Can-Can" In Play

When Russian Premier Nikita Kruschev toured the United States, he visited a Hollywood soundstage and said he was shocked by the "decadent" dancing he saw there. Kruschev then demonstrated for a reporter the dance that he said had disgusted him.

This tidbit of current history is captured for the stage in **THE ACCIDENT**, an original play being presented for the first time this Friday and Saturday at 8:00 p. m. on the Louisburg College Auditorium stage.

**THE ACCIDENT** is one of the two original scripts chosen from those submitted across the state for presentation at the State Drama Festival at Chapel Hill. "Whether we'll accept that invitation," says author-director Bob Versteeg, "depends on how well we've progressed by then--mid-April--on our next show, **HAMLET**. If we think we can spare the time, we'll go."

The assignment of impersonating Russian Premier Kruschev goes to Fred Cook, who has acted in five previous Players' shows. How does he feel about the role? "I like

character parts, and Kruschev is a real character. I think the part has a lot of opportunities for humor."

In our opinion, turning Santa Claus into Kruschev is a neat stage trick. Now, if the Players could come up with a trick to

turn Kruschev into Santa Claus, that would really be a show. The State Department might buy out the entire auditorium.
