

Haley-Taylor Vows Spoken Sunday

On Sunday, August twenty-third, at four thirty o'clock in the afternoon Miss Constance Jaunita Taylor became the bride of Randall Charles Haley of Raleigh in the Centerville Baptist Church. Doctor Eugene Owens of Wake Forest, former pastor of the bride, officiated at the double ring ceremony.

The church sanctuary was decorated with emerald fern, floor baskets of pink and white gladioli and chrysanthemums interspersed with seven-branched candelabra holding burning pink tapers.

Prior to the ceremony, Mrs. Esley Manning, organist, and Mrs. William R. Watkins, pianist, presented a program of nuptial music including "Clair De Lune," by Debussy, "Ave Maria," by Schubert, "Whither Thou Goest," by Singer, "Liebestraume," by Liszt, "Indian Love Call," by Fritol, "One Alone," by Romberg, "O Perfect Love," by Barnby, and "The Voice that Breathed O'er Eden," by Dikes, "The Bridal Chorus," by Wagner and the "Wedding March," by Mendelssohn. Her tiered veil of silk illusion fell from a headpiece of lace centered with self fabric rose embroidered with pearls and crystals. She carried a cascade of American Beauty roses centered with a white orchid.
