

## Louisburg College Holds Parent's Day

## Receives Recognition

Allen Clinton Daniels, Jr., a 1963 graduate of Edward Best High School, received the American Farmer Degree at the National Convention of the Future Farmers of America held recently in Kansas City, Missouri. He was one of the twenty-three boys from North Carolina receiving this honor, being selected from a membership of 23,000.

Recipients for this honor are selected on the basis of their work in the FFA, community organizations, and their home farming programs. While in high school, he served as a chapter officer for two years, received local and federation awards in forestry and electrification, represented the chapter in various contests and served on numerous committees during the four years he was enrolled at Edward Best. At home he carried out supervised farming programs having much variety.

A. C., who lives with his parents on Route 1, Castalia, N. C., has been active in youth activities of Cedar Rock Baptist Church where he is a member. During the past year he carried on an extensive farming program at home and at the same time attended N. C. State College in Raleigh where he is still enrolled in the Agricultural Institute program.

He received the Green Hand Degree in 1960, Chapter Farmer Degree in 1961, and the Carolina Farmer Degree in 1963. R. J. Sutton, Teacher of Agriculture at Edward Best, reported that as far as it can be determined, A. C. is the third rural youth from Franklin County to receive this award since the FFA originated in 1928.
