Franklinton Housewife:

First Road Fatality Of Year

A 58-year-old Franklinton housewife became the first highway fatality of the new year in Franklin County last Monday as a result of injuries received in a head-on collision near Franklinton, Sunday night. Mrs. Opal Barnette Maye, 6 Green Street, Franklinton died in Wake Memorial Hospital Monday morning around 9:30 following an accident one mile south of Franklinton, Sunday night around 11:15. Mrs. Maye's brother, Thurston Barnette, 62, also received critical injuries in the accident. Mr. Barnette is listed as in critical condition in Wake Memorial Hospital. Claude Eledson Spivey, 27-year-old Negro of Youngsville, driver of the 1958 Ford which struck the car driven by Mrs. Maye, was hospitalized in Franklin Memorial Hospital. He was released from the hospital Tuesday and lodged in

Franklin County jail here in Louisburg pending trial on charges of driving on the wrong side of the highway and manslaughter. Charles E. Richardson, 22, and Joe Baker, 38, passengers in the Spivey car, received minor injuries. They were treated and released at the local hospital. Trooper D. C. Day, who investigated the accident, reported that the accident occurred as the 1953 Chevy II driven by Mrs. Maye rounded a curve and met the Spivey car in the lane of the Maye car. Mrs. Maye, according to Day, had pulled to the shoulder of the road when struck. The impact of the crash knocked the Maye car back about ten feet, said Day. Funeral services for Mrs. Maye were conducted Tuesday

at the Franklinton Methodist Church. She is survived by her husband, John Rencher Maye, one daughter, Mrs. Tillie May Joyner of Wake Forest; three sisters, Mrs. Owen Daniel and Mrs. S. M. Newton, both of Creedmore and Mrs. Johnny Currin of Oxford; three brothers, Thurston and M. F. Barnette, both of Franklinton, and Samuel W. Barnette of Durham; and one grandchild.

Franklinton Child Injured In Auto-Bicycle Collision

Vickie Gay Harris, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Harris of Franklinton was critically injured when struck by an automobile as she attempted to cross U. S. 1 on a bicycle last Saturday. Witnesses said that the child rode her bicycle directly into the path of a car driven by Robert Lindsay McDonald, 62, of Wurttenburg, Ontario, Canada, as she left the parking area of a shopping center on the western edge of Franklinton. The child was taken to Franklin Memorial Hospital in Louisburg suffering from a compound fracture of the arm, numerous severe lacerations and possible fractures. The accident was witnessed by three State Highway Patrolmen, who were parked nearby. Cpl. J. E. Rawls, Troopers E. M. Roberts and Bill Etheridge reportedly heard the impact and turned in time to see the accident. Photographer T. H. Pearce said that he and Etheridge were inside a nearby store with Etheridge leaving the store in time to see part of the accident. The accident was ruled unavoidable and no charges were filed. Mrs. McDonald, a passenger in her husband's car, received severe facial cuts. The condition of the child is reported to be improving.

Louisburg Fire Call

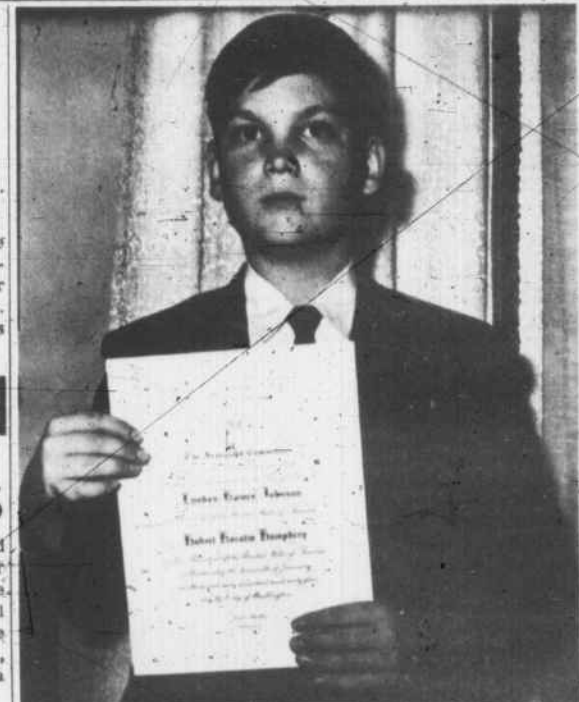
