

South Granville Vikings Rip Bulldogs, 40-6

Only Bulldog Bright Spot

South Granville's Vikings rolled out the welcome mat for everyone but Louisburg Friday night as they used a homecoming contest as an excuse to roll up their biggest point total in the school's history.

Before it was over the Vikings, who had won only once previously this season, had humiliated the visiting Bulldogs' offensive machine and had themselves unleashed a devastating attack that buried Louisburg, 40-6.

It was the second worst loss since 1959 for Coach Ivey Bolton's Bulldogs who, like the Vikings, were attempting to end a three-game losing streak Friday night.

The Vikings broke their victory famine by producing a sticky defense that limited the visitors to a minus 43 yards rushing, and by producing at least one touchdown in each quarter.

Quarterbacks Dennis Lester and Terry Woodlief were the chief point producers for Coach Bobby Collins' crew. Lester scored three touchdowns and an extra point, and Woodlief passed for two touchdowns and scored a third in addition to picking up two extra points.

The Vikings wasted little time going out in front in the contest,

scoring the first time they got possession of the ball. Putting the opening kickoff in play on their own 47, South Granville shook off two penalties before sending David Bailey on a 37-yard gallop that carried to the

Louisburg 20. Six plays later Woodlief sneaked over from the two, and Steve Boone's plunge with 8:08 remaining gave South Granville a 7-0 margin.

Minutes later Lester returned a Louisburg punt 24 yards to the Louisburg 23, and in six plays South Granville had another score as Lester plowed over from the one with 10:22 remaining in the second stanza. Woodlief passed to end Carson Smith for the point after touchdown.

Later in the quarter, after a fourth down gamble lost 11 yards for Louisburg, the Vikings put the ball in play on the Louisburg 27 with 1:02 remaining. A 15-yard holding penalty dropped them back to the 39, but Bailey picked up ten of these on the next play. With 11 seconds remaining Woodlief found end Gerald Whitfield in the clear and uncorked a 29-yard strike good for a touchdown. Bailey ran the extra point to give the Vikings a 21-0 halftime advantage.

The night got no shorter for the Bulldogs, who were unable to move with the second half

kickoff and sent Jimmy Cheson into punt formation. He fumbled the snap and was downed on the Louisburg 15. On the next play Steve Boone raced into the end zone, but South Granville was guilty of holding and the touchdown was called back. Louisburg held on the series, but to little avail. After trying a pass and two running plays, the Bulldogs found themselves needing 21 yards for a first down. Cheson again dropped back to punt, and this time it was junior Roy Montague who broke through to block the attempt, with South Granville recovering on the Bulldog's seven. Four plays later Lester romped across from two yards out for the score. Woodlief's attempt-

ed conversion pass was incomplete, and the Vikings settled for a 27-0 lead with 3:53 remaining in the quarter.

Louisburg, unable to move on the ground all night, began clicking with its passing attack after the fourth Viking tally. After Jimmy Geddie was tackled after his pass to open the series, a roughing the passer call gave Louisburg a first down on the South Granville 48. Staying mainly in the airways, Louisburg moved 47 yards in 12 plays before Geddie sneaked for the last yard that put the visitors on the scoreboard. He attempted to pass for the extra point, but the Viking front wall never let him get the throw off. South Granville added to their margin after an exchange of the

football, and Lester ran seven yards for a touchdown with 3:42 remaining to cap a 57-yard drive that took 10 plays. Bailey was stopped short on the extra-point try and the score stood 33-6.

With 2:44 remaining in the contest, South Granville blocked another Cheson punt, recovering this time on the Louisburg 18. Four plays later Woodlief passed to Carson Smith on a touchdown play that covered 25 yards. Roy Montague took a Woodlief aerial for the extra point.

South Granville threatened once more in the half, moving to the Louisburg seven after Lester intercepted a Geddie pass. The final gun sounded before the Vikings could add another touchdown.

Husband Gets Promotion

Norfolk, Va. -- Captain Nathan Cole, Jr., USN, of Wilmington, N. C., was promoted to that rank in recent ceremonies here while serving as assistant staff legal officer for Rear Admiral E. B. Taylor, Commandant of the Fifth Naval District.

Since the Korean War, the veteran officer has been a Navy law specialist with duty in the Pentagon office of the Navy Judge Advocate General and on the staff of the Commander, Atlantic Fleet Destroyer Force. He reported to Naval District Headquarters at Norfolk in July, 1963.
