

Hurricanes Eliminated From Playoffs

Coach Russ Frazier in his weekly report on the Lousburg College Hurricanes reports that the team's double loss to conference foe, Chowan Saturday, eliminated them from the District 10 Playoffs to be played here this year for the first time.

We failed to hit again Saturday and lost 1-0 and 7-1 decisions to Chowan. The defeats eliminated us from the Eastern District Tournament here next week. Pete Eyer pitched a 2 hitter for us in the first game but we couldn't get him any runs although we had a couple of opportunities. We got only 4 hits the first game and 1 the second. I don't know what has happened to the hitting unless the boys are pressing too hard. We tore both the boys up who pitched for Chowan Saturday earlier in the season.

We play Ferrum here Wednesday in a doubleheader beginning at 1:30. Friday we go to Duke and Saturday play Carolina a doubleheader here. People in this area will get a chance to see Carolina's Gary Hill Saturday. He has 5 shutouts so far and has given up 1 run in

6 games and it was unearned. He is ranked in the \$50,000 bracket by scouts who say he is the best in North Carolina and one of the best prospects in the country.

M.T. Lamm Marks Another "First"

Spring Hope--A Spotted Swine breeder from near here, M. T. Lamm of the Seven Paths Community, is responsible for another "first" on having produced a third certified boar.

Lamm, who has been in the swine business for 31 years, is believed to be the only breeder to have three "Spots" certified.

Lamm's first certified boar, Mr. Streamer, won his honors in 1957. Lamm recalled at that time that while a student at Wake Forest College, he'd found that Greek was hard to pass. He'd since decided that getting Greek was easier than getting a hog certified, he asserted.

The producer kept at his game, however, and received certification papers the next year for a second boar, Streamline. It was then that Jack Kelly, Extension animal husbandry specialist from N. C. State, said that Lamm had done the "best job" of any breeder in the nation in the meat-type certification program.

Now comes Bildalyn King, who brings on more accolades. For it is J. Raymond Woodard's findings that the litters this boar has sired have been among

the fastest gainers he's worked with.

Usually, states Woodard, who holds the Extension animal husbandry post, it takes from 8 to 10 litters for a boar to be certified.

Lamm says that although good breeding stock is sacrificed upon being slaughtered, this requirement is necessary in knowing that your breeding line is of the top quality.

Lamm, for years, has won blue ribbons at the State Fair for his prize hogs. An officer of the North Carolina Spotted Swine Breeders Association, he also has been named as a member of the Hall of Fame by the Animal Science Club at N. C. State.

The former high school principal has been active in church work through the years and has served the Tar River Baptist Association as clerk.

He and Mrs. Lamm, who recently celebrated their golden wedding anniversary, are parents of five children. They are Dr. Wilbur Lamm, editor of the Baptist Sunday School Quarterly, Nashville, Tenn.; Dean, longtime civilian worker with the U. S. Navy; Elbert, vocational agriculture teacher at Benvenue School; Paul, in Williamston with a credit firm; and a daughter, Marjorie (Mrs. June) Chewning of Goldsboro. Marjorie has been supervisor of surgery at Wayne County Hospital for a number of years.
