The bridesmaids' attire were similar to those of the matron of honor.

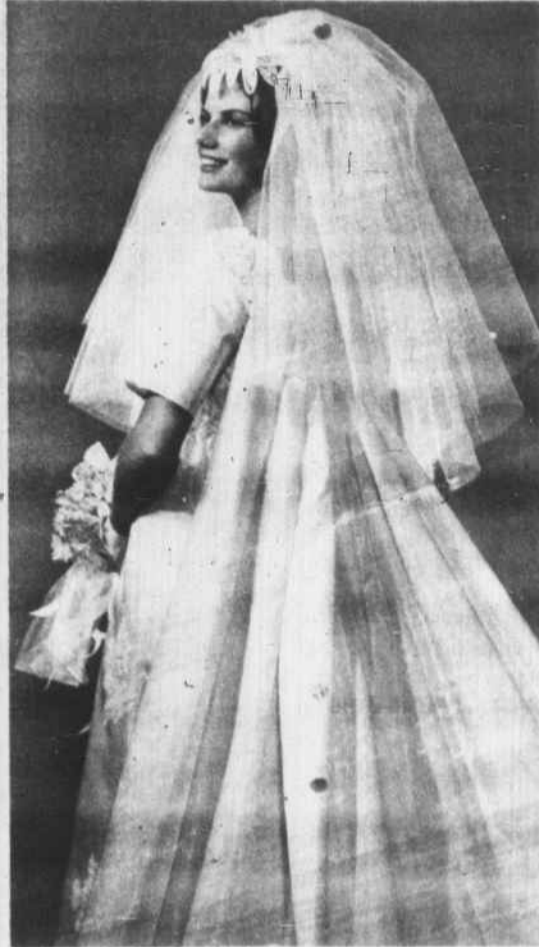
