

**ASCS Elections** To Be Held **By Mail** An announcement made public today by the local ASCS

Office Manager, John R. Davis, says that 1967 ASCS Community Committeemen will be elected in September by mail. The notice also notes that community boundaries will remain the same as heretofore. The text of the notice follows:

"A slate of nominees will be prepared for each of the ten communities in Franklin County. Eligible voters have the right to nominate by petition if they so desire. Each petition must be limited to one nominee, and must be signed by at least six eligible voters. All petitions must be received by the ASCS Office no later than August 16, 1966. Persons nominated by pe-

tition will be placed on the slate if eligible and willing to serve. The slate of nominees for each community will consist of six or more persons including those nominated by petition.

Nominees should be currently engaged in the op-erations of a farm, and be well qualified for committee work, and represent the various sections and types of agriculture in the community. Any person
