Head Start Project To Begin

(Frk. B.W.) The Franklinton City Schools will conduct a Head Start Project for pre-school children beginning Monday, June 19, 1967, in the Primary Department of the Franklinton High School Building. The project will operate for eight weeks and will serve all children to begin in the district during the fall of 1967 who meet certain economic criteria. The children will begin activities 8:00 a.m. Monday and they will continue until 12:15 p.m. Each child will receive a light morning meal and will be served a substantial well-balanced lunch in the cafeteria. The children will be transported by two county school buses.

There will be no fees or cost of any kind involved in the program. The Head Start Project is made possible through a federal grant to the Franklinton City Board of Education by the Office of Economic Opportunity. The teaching staff is composed of the following: Mesdames Lucy N. Green, Mary A. Dillard, Barbara H. Harris, and Carolyn S. Turner.

Homecoming Day will not be observed on this coming Sunday of Father's Day at Cypress Chapel Baptist Church. It will be held the first Sunday of October, 1967.

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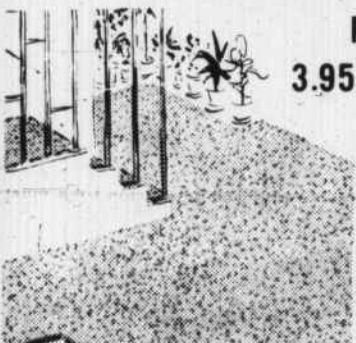
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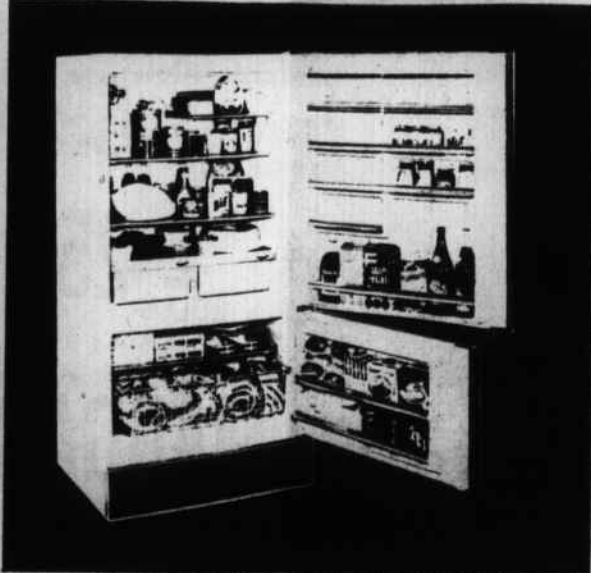


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
