Lamb Kabob Sandwiches



OUTDOOR COOKERY - TASTY AND QUICK

Enjoy beautiful summer days to the fullest and serve dinner a la patio style. This beguiling dish is at home at a simple family supper or a sunny lawn party.

LAMB KABOB SANDWICHES

6 sandwiches

- 1 cup tarragon vinegar
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon basil
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 pound boneless lamb stew meat, cut into 3/4 1-inch squares
- 18 cherry tomatoes
- 12 canned whole mushrooms
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 teaspoon rosemary, crumbled
- 6 enriched hot dog buns, split and toasted

Combine vinegar, onion, garlic, olive oil, salt, pepper, basil and bay leaf in saucepan; bring to boil. Remove from heat; cool to lukewarm. Stir in lamb cubes. Cover and refrigerate 3 to 4 hours, stirring occasionally. Remove lamb from marinade, drain thoroughly on absorbent paper. For each kabob, arrange lamb, tomatoes and mushrooms alternately on skewer. Broil in preheated broiler or grill 4 to 5 minutes, or until lamb is done. Meanwhile, blend together butter and rosemary. Butter buns. Place kabob between bun halves; remove skewer and close. Serve hot.
