### Winner Appears In College Concert

James Dick, another Texas pianist,--praised by the Soviet newspaper, TASS, and honored at the White House as a finalist in the third International Tchaikovsky Piano Competition -- is currently performing throughout the United States. With the aid of the Leventritt Foundation, he will perform in concert at Louisburg College, October 19, at 8 p.m. in the College Auditorium.

In less than a year, the youthful pianist was a top finalist in three international competitions: the Busoni in Bolzano, Italy; Edgar M. Leventritt in New York, and the Tchaikovsky in Moscow.

James Dick graduated in 1963 with special honors in piano from the University of Texas where in 1961 he had been the overall winner in the Biennial Recording Competition sponsored by the National Guild of Piano Teachers. A Fulbright Scholar in London, the pianist performed frequently with the Royal Academy Orchestra with Sir John Barbiroli conducting.

His program of Vivaldi, Rachmaninoff, Beethoven, Chopin and Lees is open and free to the public.
