A green and white motif was used throughout the room. The table was centered with a bridal arrangement of white mums and gladiolas centered with white tapers.

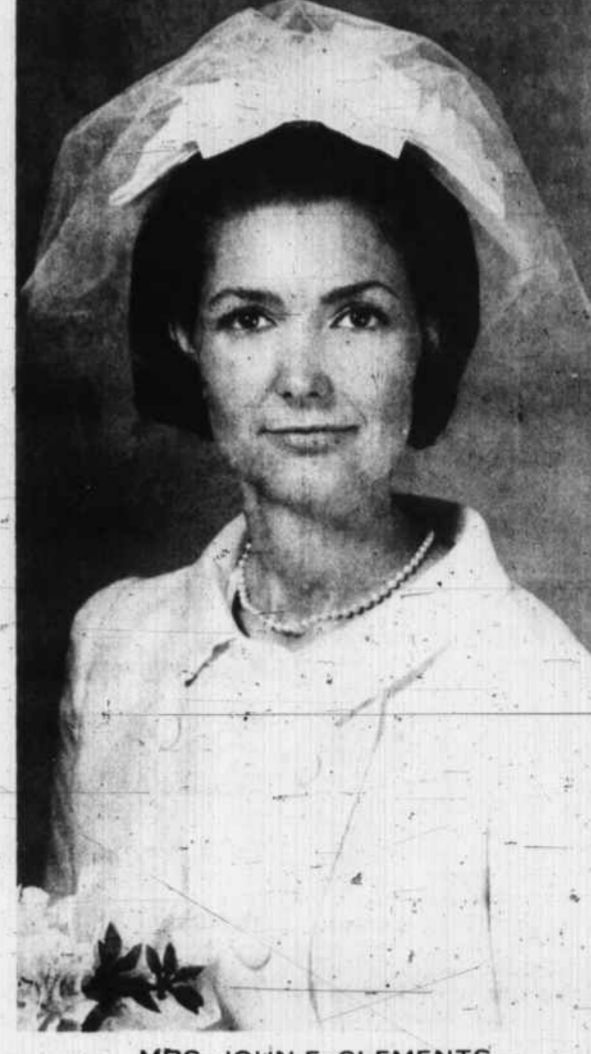
