Youngsville --- Pertinent facts from the Franklin County Unit of the American Cancer Society have been released in the interest of the Cancer Crusade which begins April first in an effort to combat cancer.

According to a 1966 Franklin County report, the number of cancers reported was forty. Number of deaths from Cancer was thirty-six. The death rate per 100,000 was 132.7. Cancer will strike one in every four Americans now living and will strike in two of three families. Two of three patients are now dying.
