He also says something should be done for the "forgotten man" -- the state employee other than teachers--and favors a pay raise for them. He listed traffic safety, mental health and taxes among other-important issues. He declined to flatly oppose a local option sales tax, saying it depended on how levied and implied he might favor it, if it became necessary to aid in school consolidation where a bond issue failed. "I cannot say-I am definitely against it", he concluded.




