Health And Beauty

Doctors tell us that the first step in reducing should be to determine if fatness really exists. This is not always easy.

If a good look in the mirror discloses the presence of bulges where none should exist, you are probably carrying too much weight. However, not everyone carries excess weight in the same places. The difference is especially striking in the two sexes. Women normally distribute their fat most heavily around the hips, thighs and lower part of the abdomen. Men usually deposit their useless fat first in the abdomen.

Slight degrees of overweight should be corrected as early as possible. You note how important this is when you know that as little as ten extra pounds causes an increase in mortality of eight per cent. Fatness is always curable, but it can be battled most successfully when the pounds are few and the condition is but several weeks or days old.

Not all the fatty tissue of our body is useless or detrimental. Certain amounts of it are quite useful and necessary. The fat which calls for reducing is that which is obviously superfluous. It is well to know that not all forms of overweight are due to fat. Some people are large because of their big frames and

tremendous muscles. Others have an accumulation of salt and water as often seen in heart or kidney disease. Uncomplicated pregnancy always causes weight gain. Tumors or growths can become large and heavy enough to increase the patient's poundage.

In a man a waist circumference greater than that of the chest is a sign of obesity. However, this is not always the case. Weak abdominal muscles can give rise to an enlarged and protruding abdomen. Distention due to gas may give the same appearance. The only sure way to determine overweight is to have a complete physical examination by a physician.
