One of the traditions in crossing the Atlantic by air is night flying, especially eastbound. I have never felt that a night flight, even in the first-class section, could really amount to first-class travel when the passenger sits up through the night.

Yet the great majority of crossings from New York and other cities depart this country at seven or eight in the evening. If the idea is to give the working man a chance to do a day's work on this side of the ocean and do the next day's in Europe, it makes sense in one way. But first--class passengers often don't adhere to such rush schedules.

And after paying several hundred dollars more for first-class accomodations, what they really get is a seat with enough room to stretch out in, better care by stewardesses and a lavish meal with plenty of wine and cocktails. But one must still sit up all night and get off the plane next morning in the suit he slept in! That isn't first-class care by any of the old stan-

The new Boeing giant may provide passengers the first truely first-class air service in years. Later versions will carry up to 490 passengers. 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
