"Oh, it's not bad," answered the father. "We get the nails wholesale."

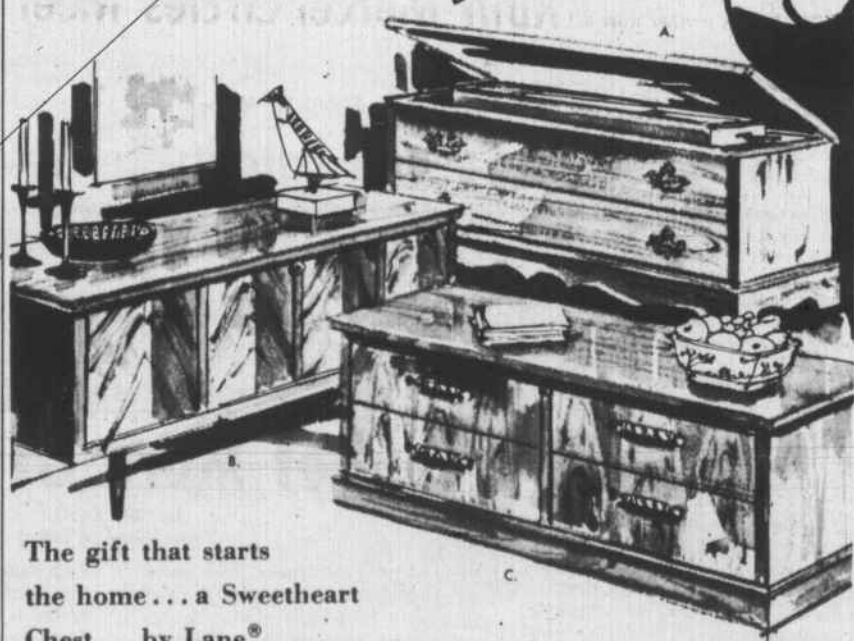

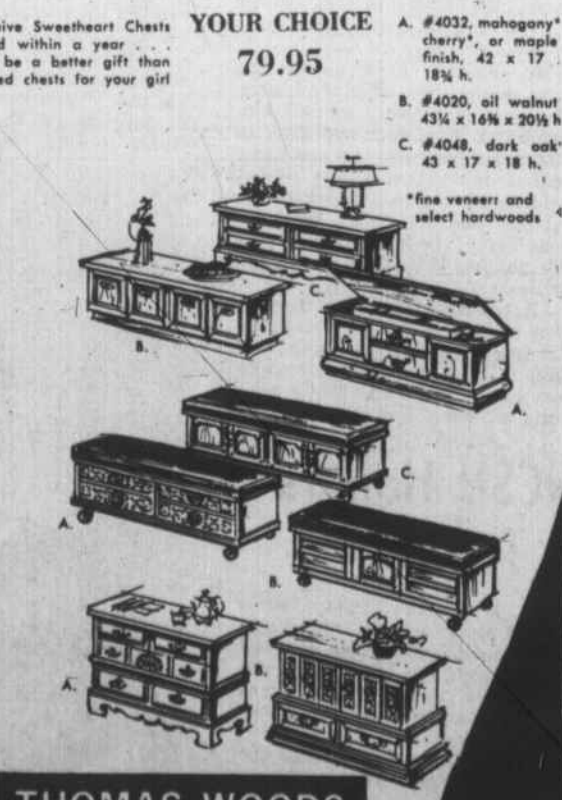
