Mrs. Emma Moore is back at home after spending several weeks in Louisburg and Rocky Mount with her daughters.

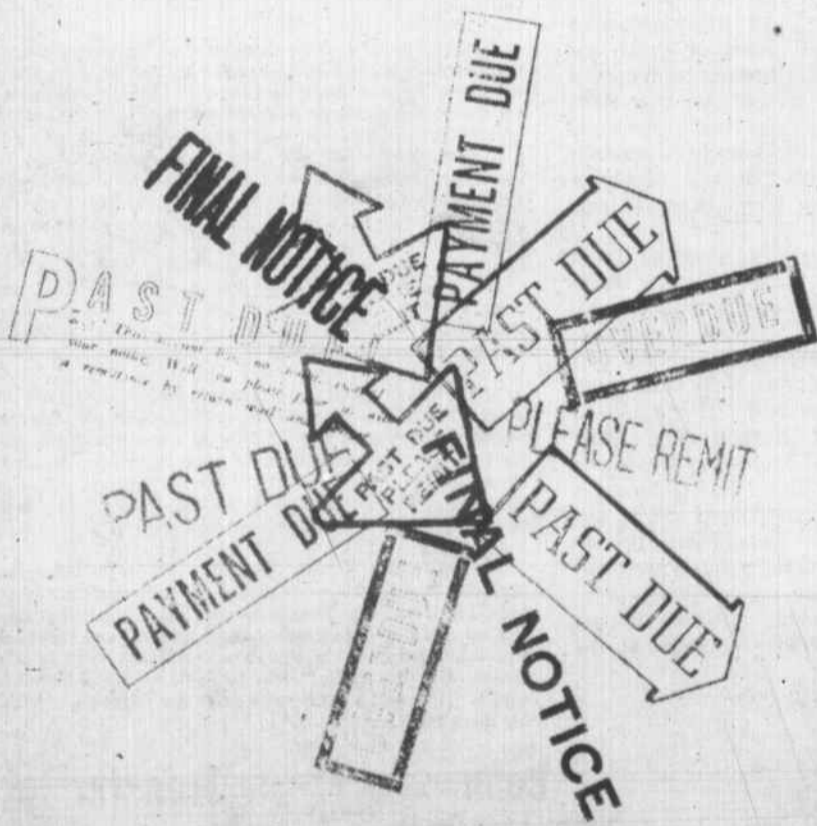
