Attend Vocational H.E. Meeting

Leonard are attending the Vocational Home Economics Teachers conference at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro August 13-16th. The program begins with a luncheon of the Home Economics Division of the North Carolina Vocational Association. Mrs. Leonard will introduce the speaker at the luncheon, Dr. Aleene Cross, the author of a new home economics text book. Mrs. Pearce will serve as a hostess for the general session on Thursday afternoon.

The theme of the conference is "Action for the Seventies-Total Commitment." Dr. Hazel Spitz, Associate Professor, Home Economics Education, University of Illinois, will describe how home economics programs can be planned and adapted for teaching disadvantaged youth and adults. Dr. Aleene Cross, Head, Home Economics Department, University of Georgia, plans to describe the needs of the Junior High School students as a basis for curriculum development. In addition to these two out-of-state consultants, Dr. Craig Phillips, Dr. Bill Brown, and Dr. Mildred Johnson will bring the participants up to date on trends and needs in education that can be met through home economics programs in North Carolina.
