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Youngsville - Jones H. Winston, partner with Youngsville Tractor & Equip-ment, White Oliver dealer on highway 96, Youngsville, attended White Oliver's "Fly-In" - a presentation and de-monstrations of its new products for 1970, at the Advanced Products Division of White Motor Corporation in Torrance, California, on November 10.

A new White Oliver tractor A new White Oliver tractor line, topped by an articulated tractor with 139 engine horsepower in diesel and 169 horsepower with LP gas, was presented to more than 1200 White Oliver - dealers, sales personnel, and invited guests flown in by chartered jet aircraft for the massive 24-hour airlift; which was characterized by air line officials as one of the largest movements of this type in commercial aviation history.

In a tour of the Advanced Products Division under the direction of Dr. John Beck, president of the research and development center which serves all White Motor Corporation divisions, the White Oliver dealers and sales personnel glimpsed some of the important new developments in engine and power train components that will emerge in production model tractors during the 1970's.

Chartered planes began lifting off from airports rang-ing from the Atlantic to the Rockies, f from the Canadian to the Mexican borders, and points in between, during the early morning hours on November 10. Landing at airports in the Los Angeles area, with the advantage of time zone changes, the entire 1200 people were seated in the arena at Torrance for the program kickoff before 12 noon, P.S.T.
