Captain Theobold with fif-teen men blockaded the road with rails. The news spread rapidly, and the whites armed from this and Morehead parishes, and went to the scene of the troables. The excitement was intense, but no dis-turbance of any, kind, occurred. One of the armed negroes said they were told to arm by the sheriff and they were told to arm by the sheriff of the parish, who is a negro, and come to Monroe and burn the town.
