### RADICAL POW-WOW.

(Weeksburg (Miss.) Herald.)

Agreeably to the call of J. T. Rankin, chairman of the republican county executive committee, a large meeting of republicans, mostly colored, assembled on Washington street, opposite the post-office last night. The meeting was called to order by Mr. Rankin who made a few introductory remarks but was frequently interrupted by unruly persons in the audience. After a short speech by the chairman of the executive committee, ex-Senator Postmaster Pease was introduced to the crowd and attempted to make a speech but was hooted down and finally rotten eggs were thrown at him. A man here who was being tried for stealing confessed the theft and yet the verdict was "Not guilty." If the troops do not force the election here in November (and it is hardly possible they will) as our experience teaches us that when they do things actually as they will come over to our side) the democrats will certainly carry both state and presidential elections. There is absolutely a majority of democratic voters in Florida, if every negro votes with the opposition, and there has been ever since the war. Every election has been carried by the democrats and they have been cheated by false count of votes. It arouses the righteous indignation of every citizen throughout the state to see the government in the hands of such fellows as heretofore on the shoulders of the half-civilized negro, into power. They have ceased here to hope if there is anything like fair-dealing for a continuance of power to which I say amen with all my heart.

There were quite a number of democrats in the audience who looked on at the proceedings with something of indifference, but the more thoughtful among them regretted the turn affairs had taken, for they knew how unscrupulous are the radical carpet-baggers and sealings in this part of the country, and how quickly and eagerly they would seize upon this pretext for crying out democratic outrage and calling for troops.

The fact that ex-Senator Postmaster Pease refused to join in the cry for troops two years ago, and was not at all in sympathy then with the republican party, is one of the causes of his unpopularity with the colored element now, and from all appearances his days of usefulness as a republican orator are over.

Before the meeting adjourned, Mr. Pease took occasion to lay all the blame of the interruption to democrats, but while such an excuse might do for northern ears, it was too thin for the crowd he had endeavored to address.

### RACE TROUBLES IN LOUISIANA.

(New Orleans Times.)

An Armed Band of Negroes Threaten to Burn Monroe.—The Whites arm in Self-Defense. MONROE, La., Sept. 1.—A fresh excitement sprang up last night in consequence of reports that the negroes were arming in the northern portion of the parish and were coming to burn the town. About seventy-five negroes, mounted and on foot, were found at Captain Hellop's place, where a parley ensued. The negroes refused to disarm, and said they would come back with 500 men. Captain Theobald with fifteen men blockaded the road with rails. The news spread rapidly, and the whites armed from this and Morehead parishes, and went to the scene of the troubles. The excitement was intense, but no disturbance of any kind occurred. The whites included some of the best men of the section, and they acted with great forbearance. One of the armed negroes said they were told to arm by the sheriff of the parish, who is a negro, and come to Monroe and burn the town. In the southern portion of the parish, where houses had been fired into, leading citizens report all quiet. They say some demonstrations were made last night, but nothing serious occurred. The situation is decidedly critical, but leading citizens are proceeding with prudence and moderation.

### NEW ROUTE TO RALEIGH.

(From the Charlotte Democrat.)

The new railroad known as the Raleigh & Augusta Air Line (being an extension of the Raleigh & Gaston road) will be completed this fall, to a point on the Carolina Central railway about six miles east of Rockingham in Richmond county. It is not likely that the road will be extended across the Carolina Central towards Columbia, for it will be greatly to the interest of the company to cultivate close business relations with the Carolina Central. At any rate there is not a prospect of an early extension. This new route will afford us another direct line north via Raleigh. It will be as straight as the one now run by the N. C. railroad, and it is said to be a few miles shorter. When this new line is opened, persons in this section wishing to visit their state capital may be able to get through on more convenient schedules than the ones usually kept in operation on the N. C. railroad.

### THE SITUATION IN SOUTH-EAST FLORIDA.

(From the Baltimore Gazette.)

A clergyman residing in south-east Florida, in a recent letter to a friend in this city, says of the political situation and prospects: "Anything will be an improvement on Grant & Co. ### POLITICAL NOTES.

Twenty-one of the thirty-eight states elect governors this fall.

Clapp, the government printer, who was put in office by Grant because congress kicked him out for fraud, has come out for Hayes. He would be an awful lonesome thief if he didn't.

The last year of Governor Dix's administration in New York the taxes of Columbia county were \$158,547.76. The second year under Governor Tilden, they are reduced to \$82,435.73, thus saving \$76,112.03.

Eric County, New York, paid a state tax of \$407,545.65, in the last year of republican administration. Governor Tilden has reduced it to \$213,844.30—saving to the people of that county alone the sum of \$193,701.20.

In 1874, when New York had a republican administration, Dutchess county paid a tax of \$234,404.24. This year, under Tilden and reform, it amounts to but \$124,154.02—a difference in favor of democratic administration of \$110,250.22.

Hayes has assured his friends that if elected he will make Blaine secretary of state. Blaine was defeated for the nomination which Hayes secured because his party knew that he was a congressional bribe-taker and that it could be proved on him. It seems, however, he is good enough for Hayes.

Accounts of fresh troubles come from Louisiana; the disturbances being evidently the work of radical "bull-dozers," who are inciting the negroes to attack the white people for political purposes. The forbearance and firmness of the whites are worthy of admiration, and it is to be hoped that they may not be provoked beyond the possibility of endurance.
